VAN DIJCKE created DYCKESVILLE - Wisconsin

Adventurers, emigrants or travelers, the Belgians have always been on the move. We have followed the track of six famous or unrecognized fellow countrymen. Common particularity: they left their name at the end of the world; village, falls, strait....

With its 400 kilometres of coasts bathed by Lake Michigan and Green Bay, the Door Peninsula is the first tourist destination of Wisconsin. More exactly, it is half north of the peninsula, still very woody, that attracts the townsman and woman . In the South, where the agriculture got the upper hand, cars pass but do not stop.

It is there, in the middle of the corn fields, that lives in the United States the most important community of Belgian origin, scattered in a dozen villages in the suggestive names: Namur, Brussels, but also Dyckesville, recollection of an emigrant native from Antwerp (Belgium).

In the middle of the XIXth century, some thousand Belgians emigrated in the USA to avoid the misery that raged in campaigns, especially in Brabant and around Namur.

A laudatory brochure induce them to Wisconsin: " if you think of a journey, be not afraid of taking food because, on the vessel, you will only have dry food such as some bread, beans and rice in very small quantity, " writes **Cordélie Jacqmot** to her family that stayed in Grez-Doiceau. " When you arrive in the American cities, it is necessary to stay in waiting rooms and not to look after inns, because they are too much rogues, mainly to the emigrants".

Louis Van Dijcke, is not a farmer, but a sailor as his father. He emigrated to the USA in 1855, at the age of 27. First he holds a shop in New York, then settles down on the banks of the Green bay, some miles of the city of Green Bay, where he set up a grocer's shop.

"Here, there are one or two inns, or places where the travelers can rest for a night, and a very good shop held by Mr. Van Dijcke ", tells a witness quoted by two local historians, Jeanne and Lester Rentmeester. His establishment proposes almost all which we can need in a new country, from wooden shoes to the bags of flour. And not only wooden shoes, because we noticed some good shoes and boots for men.



Van Dijcke also builds a jetty where the farmers of surrounding area come to load their wood on boats to Green Bay. Because it is the forest which waited for the Europeans in Wisconsin. 300-years old pines, sometimes peaking at 35 meters. Three of them are enough for building a house. Then, before cultivating, the pioneers have to reclaim.

Fortunately, the wood industry is prosperous especially after the American Civil War. In this time, we count a dozen sawmills in the region occupied by the Belgians, where manufacturing of shingles (boards for covering the houses) saves the immigrants of the extreme poverty.

In this context, Dyckesville becomes a small center of transport, and his founder gets promotion. Married to the young Octavia Caesar, native of Beauvechain, who gives him six children, Louis VAN DIJCKE held the functions of postmaster, prosecutor and treasurer of the municipality. In 1863, he gives up 1,2 hectares to the parish for the construction of a church which will carry the name of..... Saint Louis. Then, in 1868, he moves to Green Bay, where he set up a brewery and a shop of fabrics and becomes one of the notables of the city.

He was only 52 years old when he died in 1881, tells Mary Ann Defnet, official genealogist of the belgo-American community of Wisconsin. All his companies disappeared for a long time.

FamilySearch.org is developing ways to make organizing, viewing, and sharing personal family histories online easier, faster and more accurate for people. The first of these tools is FamilySearch Indexing. This will become a worldwide effort to harness volunteers to gather, transcribe, and index records of genealogical significance.

This project would include a significant digital image set of records including vital records for the U.S., Canada, Pacific; British parish registers for Europe; and vital and census records for South America. With Today's Scan capabilities they are able to accomplish 3 million images per month, approximately 25,000 rolls per year - - Tomorrow: over 12 million images per month with 10 scanners; over 32 million images per month with 25 scanners, approximately 370,000 rolls per year, and approximately 6 years to cover the entire Granite Mountain Record Vault Collection.


VAN DIJCKE created DYCKESVILLE - Wisconsin

The jetty was closed down in the 1920s. Louis VAN DIJCKE was perhaps well known in his time, but there is no monument to his memory in the area. I think nevertheless that the residents of Dyckesville know the origin of the name of the village.

The residents of this part of Wisconsin remained, indeed, proud of their Belgian roots. So, Peninsula Belgian American Club collects about 300 fanatics. Certainly, the average of age increases there, and the Walloon language gets lost. But "Belgian Days", the annual fair of the community, which takes place during the second weekend of July in Brussels continue to attract a big crowd: 7.000 to 8.000 persons, according to the organizers. And the big attraction is the procession of the two giants (made in Belgium) Joseph and Jacqueline, and the meal married cheerfully green sausage, broth made with chickens and Belgian pies.

Belgians passing through Wisconsin must not forget to visit the park "Heritage Hill", which is like a little local Bokrijk. Fitted out on a hill of Green Bay, this outdoor museum of 20 hectares collects twenty two historic buildings, witnesses of the everyday life in the region, from 1672 till 1905. At the end of the visit, tourists discover a "Belgian Farm" that belonged formerly to the family Massart, native of Marchovelette. There, Tim wearing suspenders and trilby hat, explains - in 1905, all the family lived here, children and the grandparents.

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GALLETTES - BELGIAN WAFFLE COOKIES

Ingredients:

1/2 pound butter1/4 cup brown sugar1 cup granulated sugar1 tablespoon cinnamon1 tablespoon salt1 tablespoon vanilla1 shot whiskey4 or 5 eggs (separated)2 cups flour

Cream butter and sugar. Add cinnamon, salt, vanilla, egg yolks, whiskey and beat well. Add 1/2 of the flour then fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Add remaining flour and beat well.

Bake in Belgian waffle iron. Makes about 3 dozen.

BELGIAN "BROWN SUGAR" TARTS

Ingredients:

1/4 lb. Butter1 tablespoon shortening5 eggsHandful of brown sugarSaltAbout 1/4 cup of milk2.5 packages of dry yeast5 cups of flour

Vanilla

- Dissolve yeast in water with a pinch of sugar. Add other ingredients and mix well.
- · Divide dough into 5-6 balls and let rise.
- · Place in greased and floured pie pans.
- Sprinkle with brown sugar and drizzle with slightly beaten egg, milk, sugar and vanilla
- Dot with butter.
- Bake in pre-heated 325 degree oven for 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned

Makes about 5-6 tarts.
